culturally relevant textbooks that saved students over \$9 million in the last several years. I'm also proud of the recognition our colleges have received on a national level. They have been named Aspen Top 100 community colleges several years in a row and one received the Leader College and Leader College of Distinction recognition from Achieving the Dream.

Advice to New and Continuing CEOs:

- Be authentically you. People will appreciate that more than you know.
- Cherish and care for your team because you won't be successful without them.
- Make students your north star, and at the end of the day, you'll never get lost.
- Don't let other people define your success. Success shouldn't be measured in personal, quantified achievements but rather in the relationships you form and the accomplishments of others around you.

Proudest Accomplishments: I am grateful for the team we built that leads with compassion and kindness. We expanded our Rising Scholars classes and services, providing instruction to more than 1,000

students and supporting them when they return to their communities. Of all the work we do, changing the lives of students who are incarcerated and the lives of their families is by far, the most impactful.

Advice to New and Continuing CEOs:

Susan Sperling, Ph.D.

President Emerita, Chabot College Retired August 2023

Proudest Accomplishments: Sustaining and developing diverse innovative programs at Chabot that best serve our students and communities. This sometimes required overcoming initial bureaucratic inertia or political opposition, but I concluded early on that avoiding controversy was ethically untenable for me.

Advice to New and Continuing CEOs:

All of your work as a leader is important, whether forwarding DEI, workforce development, student completion and transfer rates, or expanding financial resources. But your commitment to protecting the "sacred space" of the community college classroom must always be a preeminent goal. For it is within our classrooms that critical thinking and the ability to distinguish fact from fiction are nurtured as bedrocks of democracy. At a time of great challenges to the democratic vision, from both within and without the California Community College system, nothing could be more crucial to your work.

Joe Wyse, Ed.D.

Superintendent/President, Shasta-Tehama-Trinity Joint Community College District Retired December 2023

Proudest Accomplishments: There are many things I am proud of from my years of service at Shasta College, including serving our community through a major fire, passing a facilities bond to improve our



facilities and infrastructure for the long-term, starting new programs and services, seeing a rise in student success metrics and more. However, upon reflection, I am most proud of the team I put together that made these things happen. It takes time and effort to assemble a great team, and I have been fortunate to have had two such leadership teams.

Advice to New and Continuing CEOs: I have been honored to get to know many of my colleagues and have learned much through these relationships. I would advise you to develop a circle of CEO friends whom you can call upon during the difficult times and to celebrate the good things. This helps counter the fact that this is a lonely job and no one on our campuses understands what it is to be the CEO. When making decisions, make what is good for students your guiding light. This will help you through the difficult calls we face. Finally, try to remind yourself that it is not about you. It is about the work - improving things at our institutions so we serve our students and our communities better.
